"GRAND FINALE"

It was **December 12, 2015** and likely the last fishing trip of the year for me. **Usually** by this time of year in Michigan, it is **snowing and ice** is beginning to form on the water, so Dave Cramer and I decided we had better get out and do some fishing. The **Grand River** was selected because previous trips on the river had produced, and we hoped to make this one memorable. The weather was **50 degrees, cloudy, foggy, and misting with no wind---**very comfortable for this time of year. **Water color was 3 feet**, quite good. We started out trolling crankbaits and

casting spinners for steelhead, but after a couple of hours and no hits, **decided to anchor and cast jump lures** on some previously mapped structures. This proved to be the **correct depth and speed control** needed at that time. One of the boats' occupants was accused of exhibiting a memory lapse in the art of timekeeping and the other for starting a "fish call war", so the chatter remained back and forth all day.

13 fish were caught on this trip from 5 anchoring positions. Despite the fact that the fish were mostly scattered and slow, every spot produced at least one fish. Fish caught included 2 walleye to 15 inches, 1 small pike, and 5 smallmouth bass to 15 inches. The most fun, however was on one spot where big flathead catfish were schooled up. The smallest was 20 inches, the next 33 inches and 16 pounds, the next 35 inches and 21 pounds, the next 37 inches and 24 pounds, and the biggest was 40 inches and 35 pounds. That was the largest fish ever netted in my boat, and what a fight it put up! Note the big increase in weight of these catfish with just a few extra inches in length. All the fish were released, and it was a great day for the years' final trip on the Grand!
