## **GRAND RIVER FISHING REPORT NOVEMBER 11, 2004**

## **"BOTH CASTING AND TROLLING"**



2 nice Smallmouth Bass from the Grand River

The weather forecast for Thursday was bad with clear skies and 25 mph winds predicted. Don Stephens had reported catching 3 steelhead only 2 days before in the Grand River, so I decided to go there and try for some steelhead. The water color was about 4 feet and the water temperature 41 degrees. This section of the Grand has 7 structures (holes) that we have mapped and are familiar with. The plan was to troll these structures with slower speed crankbaits at different depths, which has been successful in the past. Throughout the day, all 7 structures were checked in this manner with only 2 undersize smallmouth bass caught trolling. The steelhead were not active (or possibly even present in this section of river) at this time. Other boats had no reports of fish either. This would have been the entire report for the day had different speeds and depths not been checked by casting jump lures.

**Spoonpluggers**, however, **are aware that both casting and trolling are necessary** to thoroughly fish an area. **Each structure was** further **studied** during the trolling process and **specific spots were selected for casting**. **Spoonplugs** were **cast first** 

but it was soon determined that the **speed was too fast** for the season and cold temperatures. Each anchoring position was **then fancast** with  $\frac{1}{2}$  **ounce** jump lures (**bladebaits**) to more thoroughly **check slower speeds** and different depths. This proved to be **the lure presentation that was needed**. Because of the cold temperatures, a very slow speed (**short hop**) was used. A **number of fish were caught**, with **all but one structure producing fish** on the cast. 2 **flathead catfish** (21 inches), **5 pike to 27 inches**, **2 walleye** (17 and 18 inches) and **18 smallmouth bass up to 18 inches** were caught. **5** consecutive **casts produced 5 fish at one spot**, with 6 of 7 structures producing multiple fish.

The **knowledge gained about each structure** will be **used to improve catches on future trips** to this section of river. The **weather did not turn out as predicted**. Maximum **winds** were about **12 mph** and the "clear sunny skies" were actually **high cirrus clouds along with big wide jet contrails** in the sky, **a good light condition** for fishing. It is wise to not place too much emphasis on weather predictions unless severe or dangerous conditions are certain!
