"READING MAPS AND DEFINING STRUCTURE"

The program subject was on reading and interpreting lake contour maps. Chase read from Buck Perrys'
"Green Book" (pgs 206-211) about reading maps and defining structure that could be productive. These
maps contain much information that will help us narrow down our fishing before we get on the water. How
do we differentiate between "trolling water" and "fishing water" where we concentrate our efforts? Bucks'
"Structure Situations" booklet was shown around and recommended as something to have in the boat for
accurate identification of structure type. It lists the 17 types of structures available to the fish, both
manmade and natural. The 3 main ingredients we need to be aware of are deep holes or channels,
structures, and breaklines. With this information we can evaluate each structure as to its potential for
producing fish. A video was shown of Frank Hamill evaluating maps of the Tennessee River reservoirs.
Reservoirs have many more types of structures available to the fish, which makes them more difficult to
interpret. We then projected a map of Hardy Pond on the wall and Roger brought enlarged copies of specific
structures that we discussed. Map reading and interpretation is a valuable skill to have for being more
efficient in our fishing.
