"THE K.I.S.S. PRINCIPLE IN FISHING"

"A PERSON HEARS ONLY WHAT THEY UNDERSTAND"--

Larry Simonson gave the program on "The K.I.S.S. Principle in Fishing". In effect, the letters stand for "keep it simple, stupid!" One of the attractions to Spoonplugging for Larry was its' organized and simple approach to equipment and presentation procedures. Especially frustrating are all the choices of fishing tackle and lures out there nowadays. If we listened to and bought all the recommended equipment, our boats would be so jammed full, there would hardly be room for fishermen (some of us have come close!). Larry talked about the "paralysis of analysis" where there are so many choices, we end up giving up or with a very poor choice. He used an analogy of someone building a backyard deck. Normally one would plan, measure, buy the exact amount of wood needed, and build the deck with a standard set of tools. In fishing, however, we often have too many tools, lots of odd sized lumber, and no plan. It would be pure luck if we were to build a decent deck (or have fishing success) with that approach! He recommended we ask ourselves "do I need all this" and "is this just getting in the way?"

We have to get beyond looking for that "magic lure" or shortcut to success. Ask yourself: "Did I concentrate too much on the "tools" and not enough on the process or plan?" When you catch a fish do you ask "Where did he come from?" Also, if you are not catching fish do you ask yourself: "Did I check all depths and all speeds?" and "Was my mapping thorough enough?" Do you fully believe that deep water is the home of the fish? Knowledge is the key to fishing success, and with that knowledge comes the confidence to stick with it and catch more fish. Spoonplugs are teaching and disciplinary tools used to help us arrive there.

The plan is the key ingredient, and Buck Perry has given us a logical plan and simple tools that will get the job done the best and most efficiently---in all waters and for all species. Buck formed his approach around the two most important controls needed to catch fish---depth and speed, and then recommended and made tools that allow us to thoroughly control all depths and all speeds. The last part of the equation is structure, the bottom of the lake that is different from the surrounding area, which the fish use on their movments and migrations. It could not be much simpler---"Check all depths and all speeds both casting and trolling, on structure". That is a description of Spoonplugging in a nutshell and is part of the Spoonpluggers Basic Guideline written by Mr. Perry. Terry Velting said we should take that sentence and laminate it on our tackle boxes to remind us how simple it can be. Simple does not necessarily mean easy—to be successful at anything, one needs to work hard, but it gives us a simple approach that will make us successful if we stick with it, and it has been proven successful over many years by many people. That is much better than being constantly bombarded by numerous new products and methods.

Although Larry has been Spoonplugging only a few years, he shows a good grasp of the essence of what it is all about. Thanks to Larry for a great program that made us all think more about going "back to basics" in our fishing!
